Why choose Classics at Edinburgh?

With a distinguished tradition that stretches back more than four centuries, Classics at Edinburgh offers one of the widest choices of subjects and approaches of any university in the UK.

A world-leading university

The University of Edinburgh is one of the world's leading universities. We are consistently ranked among the top 50 best universities in the world, we're 22nd in the 2024 QS World University Rankings, and we attract some of the world's brightest staff and students. Edinburgh is currently ranked 10th in the world for Arts and Humanities (QS World University Rankings by Subject 2023).

The Classics department is one of the largest groups of classics-focused academics in the UK, with around 30 members of staff covering a variety of research interests. Our Classics staff are drawn not only from the UK but from Canada, Denmark, Germany, Greece, Ireland, Italy, Lithuania, and the USA; the student body, both in Classics and the wider School, is international too. This means that there is always a diversity of perspectives and traditions to draw on.

Breadth and depth of study

We offer a wide choice of programmes and more than 30 specialist course options across all the main areas of classics:

- Greek and Latin language, literature and thought
- ancient history
- classical art and archaeology

The flexible nature of our degrees enables you to expand your academic range by studying subjects outside your major discipline during the first two years. Year 1 Classics students have recently taken courses in subjects as varied as archaeology, philosophy, history and politics.

A supportive environment

We want you to feel supported throughout your time with us at Edinburgh and a wide range of services are available. The School also has a dedicated Student Support and Experience Team, Wellbeing Officer and peer support.

Overseas study trips

We encourage you to take up opportunities to study, travel or excavate abroad during your time with us. Our students have participated in overseas excavations in Italy, Georgia and Macedonia in recent years. We have some funding available to support students to undertake fieldwork during the vacation as well as funding for broader study or travel in 'classical lands'. We have also organised study trips abroad in recent years, including to Macedonia and the Bay of Naples.

During the summer break between years 1 and 2, students taking degrees involving Classical Archaeology will take a course allowing them to gain experience in excavation or museum work.

A flexible four-year degree

Edinburgh offers a four-year honours degree, which gives you the benefit of developing a breadth as well as depth of knowledge.

Among the advantages of the four-year degree are:

- Breadth of study. The flexible nature of our degrees enables you to expand your academic range by studying subjects outside your major discipline during the first two years. Year 1 Classics students have recently taken courses in subjects as varied as archaeology, philosophy, history and politics.
- Joint degrees. A huge range of joint degrees offers you the opportunity to study two disciplines in real depth.
- Third year abroad. An extensive network of reciprocal exchanges with major international universities can give you the chance to apply to study overseas for an entire year, and still spend a full three years in Edinburgh.

 Final-year dissertation. A feature of the fourth year is a dissertation undertaken by all students. This piece of original research, of between 12,000 and 14,000 words, represents the culmination of your undergraduate career and the demonstration of your abilities as an independent scholar. Joint honours degree programmes with other subjects

The classical world has had an enormous influence on the cultures, philosophies and languages of the Western world. The study of the archaeology, the history and the languages of the ancient world lends itself well to joint degrees, therefore, in complementary areas.





After your degree


With a degree in Classics from Edinburgh, you'll gain practical, intellectual and theoretical skills that are highly valued by employers.


You'll gain rigorous mental training in a range of disciplines, enabling you to demonstrate intellectual flexibility and the ability to adapt to new situations and to learn new skills.
